TCU CHI TAU EPSILON HONOR SOCIETY TO HOST AIDS OUTREACH CENTER BENEFIT DANCE CONCERT 30TH ANNIVERSARY YEAR

(FORT WORTH, TEXAS) – Chi Tau Epsilon Honor Society (XTE) announced today that it will host the *AIDS Outreach Center (AOC) Benefit Concert* on Saturday, February 25th at 7:30 pm in Texas Christian University's (TCU) Erma Lowe Hall, Studio Theatre. This is the 30th year that the benefit concert has been presented, raising funds and awareness in support of the AOC of Tarrant County.

Named "a top ten dance event of the year in the DFW Metroplex" in 2014 by dance writer, Margaret Putnam, this year's concert will once again offer an exciting program provided by dance companies and schools across the DFW community. The featured companies and schools include Bruce Wood Dance, *Dance*TCU, Fort Worth Academy of Fine Arts, Grand Prairie Fine Arts Academy, Pegasus Contemporary Ballet, Texas Ballet Theater's Studio Training Company, and Zion Dance Project. Andrew Grayman-Parkhurst, who founded this concert in 1993 as XTE President, will return to recognize this milestone year with current XTE leadership. In 1993, Grayman-Parkhurst organized TCU College of Fine Arts students to honor accompanist Lee Fincher, who had recently lost his battle to HIV/AIDS, with a benefit concert. As the new tradition continued over the next 12 years, the concert made an effective difference in the larger community. In 2005, Vanessa Watters Opalo and Suzanne Garrison Ehinger, TCU School for Classical & Contemporary Dance (SCCDance) dance majors and XTE officers, re-established the priority for philanthropy as an ongoing commitment of XTE and revitalized the concert in the SCCDance community.

For the next five years, the concert showcased works by students, faculty, and guest artists at TCU. In 2011, XTE and Fort Worth high school dance programs formed an alliance to expand awareness. And in 2012, XTE leaders chose to perform *Dance*TCU works and share the landscape with professional dance companies in the region.

Texas Ballet Theater's Studio Training Company will premiere an ensemble work, *Figures*, choreographed by TBT principal dancer, Alexandra F. Light. Pegasus Contemporary Ballet will showcase a female duet, *Parallel*, that was originally created for the production *Represented in Movement* by Gregory Dolbashian. Bruce Wood Dance brings *Our Last Lost Chance*, choreographed by the founding artistic director, Bruce Wood, a deeply stirring dance portrayed through beautiful partnering and intimacy. Zion Dance Project will perform excerpts from Vincent Hardy's *Spirituals*, an ensemble dance that explores three pieces of work that unveil the passion and depth of the human soul.

In addition, Fort Worth Academy of the Fine Arts (FWAFA) and Grand Prairie Fine Arts Academy (GPFAA), will both present ensemble works. FWAFA students will perform, *Exit to Cypress*, choreographed by Kasi Kirkpatrick, and GPFAA students will perform *Wildflowers*, choreographed by Jaiquan Laurencin.

Also on the program are three works presented by *Dance*TCU, each choreographed by BFA graduating seniors: Beth Kendrick's *Looking In*, Kira Daniels' *Line-Point-Line*, and Mikayla Rudolf's *Triptych*. These three works have also been selected by SCCDance faculty to perform at the upcoming American College Dance Association Conference.
